

The 2nd Bestest Songs I Ever Wrote" Liner Notes

1. Hardwick 1961 (3:11)

(From The Album "Welcome To Our Vermont" - 2017)

Here's a detailed and factual snapshot of the town of Hardwick, Vermont introducing local people, places and things, just as they appeared back in 1961 with the Bob Wills fiddle tune, "Take Me Back To Tulsa." The Bob Wills' 1941 recording is one of eight country music performances selected for the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame's "500 Songs That Shaped Rock & Roll." "Hardwick

1961" has Ramblers Rick, Taryn, Dave and Julia Shannon-Grillo taking descriptive verses along with special guest Jamie Lee Thurston.

2. Walking Around Money (2:57)

(From The Album "Riding My Guitar" - 2013)

Following the Great Depression, the amount of money a man had in his pockets gave him confidence and swagger. I remember hearing the old timers talk about "Walking Around Money" and how it registered on the social scale. Rambler Dave Rowell renders this heartfelt song, fraught with bragadocio.

3. I'm Gonna Take It With Me When I Go (3:23)

(From The Album "Green Mountain Standard Time" - 2016)

The ultimate answer for those who amass and collect and what could become of those treasures.

4. Here's Yer Hat, What's Yer Hurry (4:04)

(From The Album "Green Mountain Standard Time" - 2016)

This was one of my mother's favorite sayings from back in the '50s that she frequently inflicted upon my little friends when one of them got on her nerves. Her biggest compaint? "That kid is too boring!"

5. I Love Western Swing (3:39)

(From The Album "Green Mountain Standard Time" - 2016)

This song documents the history of Western Swing music and it honors the founding fathers of Western Swing music as originated in Fort Worth, Texas in the early 1930s. It has been adopted as the "Exclusive Theme Song" of the Cowtown Birthplace of Western Swing Festival held annually in Fort Worth. How did a kid from East Hardwick, Vermont fall in Love with Western Swing? I had the pleasure of playing on a package

show with two former Light Crust Doughboys, stars of 1939, Knocky Parker and Smokey Montgomery, for Easter Week on Daytona Beach in 1965 & 1966. What a fantastic introduction to Western Swing music for me! What A Crowd!

6. Yer Gonna Get Hurt (3:03)

(From The Album "I Rode The Ti" - 2008)

"You're Gonna Get Hurt" is just another country love song delivered with a universal warning.

7. Welcome To Our Vermont (3:46)

(From The Album "Welcome To Our Vermont" - 2014) Here's a Northeast Kingdom invitation for tourists to experience a no-frills "Real Vermont," just the way it is.

8. You're In Heaven (2:48)

(From The Album "I Rode The Ti" - 2008)

"You're in Heaven" is a take off of the 1946 Nat King Cole hit "Route 66" with a Vermont twist honoring Vermont's beloved Route 7, the major thoroughfare (mostly two lanes) that runs from the north to south of Vermont on the west side of the state.

9. Shelburne Yesterday (4:39)

(From The Album "Green Mountain Standard Time" - 2016) Here's another stumble through Vermont history, this time chronicling the town of Shelburne as seen through the eyes of a young boy. It's a sharply focused, accurate in every description, snapshot of a small Vermont town in the 1950s. This visit recalls many of the same experiences and memories shared by any small town resident during that time in America. While commenting that Shelburne today "is not that bad, it's just the memories I've had."

This song tells listeners to hold those experiences close to their heart.

10. I Don't Want To Play With You Anymore (3:10)

(From The Album "Riding My Guitar" - 2013)

In March of 2013, Congress shut down & stopped doing the business of the People. This song puts the situation into proper perspective, presented in playground language and performed by 10-year old Julia Shannon-Grillo, a vocalist with Rick & The All-Star Ramblers Western Swing Band. "I Don't Want To Play With You Anymore" was written on April Fool's Day and recorded in mid-April of 2013. This song was a big hit with audiences every time Julia performed it on Ramblers shows. As heard October 5th, 2013 on WDEV's "Music To Go To The Dump By" and the following week on WOKO, WVMT, WLVB & VERMONT PUBLIC RADIO.

11. Riding My Guitar (5:33)

(From The Album "Riding My Guitar" - 2013)



"Who'd Have Ever Thought That It Would Go This Long or Far? I've Had Such A Good Time Riding My Guitar."




The Last Voyage of The Ticonderoga 1954

Riding My Guitar - The Rick Norcross Story

"As a Vermont author I am always looking for iconic figures about whom I can write a new story. In the summer of 2010 I had the good fortune to meet Rick Norcross, one of Vermont's best known musicians and was delighted to learn that no one had truly chronicled his far-flung and intriguing life. Luckily for me, Rick agreed to let me research and write his biography and what a wild ride it has been! Over the past three years, Rick and I have spent hundreds of hours together. He has generously shared his extensive personal and professional archives with me.

In addition, I have done interviews with people from all over the world who have known and worked with Rick over the past fifty years. From his roots in the tiny granite town of Hardwick, to his years living inside the Shelburne Museum during which he fell in love with the great steamboat Ticonderoga, Rick is as iconic Vermont as you can get. His career as an entertainer has ranged from performing at the Hardwick Tulip

Festival, to premier folk clubs in England with the likes of Paul Simon and Diz Disley, to sharing the bill with some of the biggest acts in the country including Dave Mason, Billy Preston, Hank Williams Drifting Cowboys, Brad Paisley and John Anderson, to name just a few.

Founder of two respected coffee houses in Florida during his college years, "The Other Room" in Lakeland and "The 18th String" in Tampa, Rick continued to write and perform his unique style of folk music while working as a music journalist at The Tampa Times from 1969 to 1974. There he interviewed and photographed the most famous artists of the century including Elvis, Janis Joplin, Led Zeppelin, Johnny Cash, Elton John, The Grateful Dead, Merle Haggard, The Rolling Stones and hundreds of others.

Throughout his life, Rick has always kept his deep ties to Vermont and thankfully moved home permanently in the mid 1980's when he founded the extremely popular Green Mountain Chew Chew Food & Music Festival which ran for 24 years in downtown Burlington. He also formed New England's premier western swing band, Rick & The All-Star Ramblers Western Swing Band. Rick has been entertaining Vermonters for over fifty years.

The Rick Norcross Story is a fascinating and funny story filled with poignant and personal moments from a remarkable man's life. Confronted with difficult challenges from an early age, Rick is a person who learned how to survive by creatively turning all kinds of lemons into lemonade. The book with the accompanying album, was published in May of 2013 to help celebrate Rick's fiftieth anniversary as a professional musician.

In addition to his own music gigs, Rick and I have already been asked to make joint appearances to promote the book and his upcoming fiftieth anniversary CD. It has been an honor and a privilege to write this book and I think it will find a wide and enthusiastic audience. As a follow up to the successful release of my first novel, Cliff Walking, last year, I am really looking forward to the publication of Riding My Guitar - The Rick Norcross Story in 2013."


